Ensuring Correct VA Decisions by Reestablishing Pre-Decisional Review (48 Hour VSO Review)







What is a pre-decision review?

Errors found in 48-hour review:

- incorrect evaluations
- incorrect denials
- incorrect effective dates

April 2020, the VBA eliminated the pre-decisional review





On April 19, 2021, VBA launched the pilot *Claims Accuracy Request (CAR)*.

- NSOs can raise errors to VA within 30 days of the decision
- Expedited process
- Higher Lever of Review



S. 458, Veterans Claim Transparency Act of 2021

A bill to require the VA to provide a claimant's representative a 48-hour pre-decisional review period.



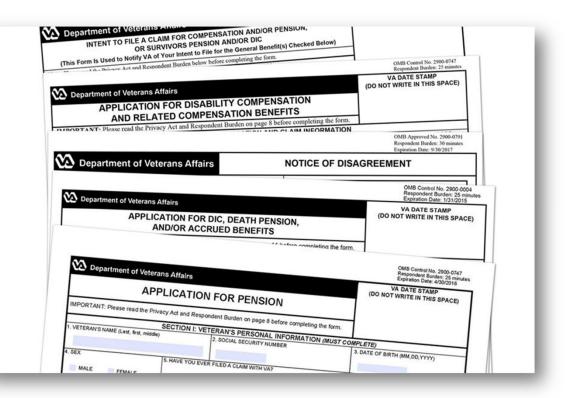


DAV is encouraged by the collaboration with VBA and optimistic that changes to the notification process and the CAR pilot will address our concerns.

If successful, we will request this be codified into law.

If not successful, we will push for enactment of the Veterans Claim Transparency Act.





Protecting Effective Dates (Standardized VA Forms)



Currently, if a veteran submits a claim or appeal on the wrong form, it may take VA months to review and advise the veteran that the claim will not be accepted because it was submitted on the wrong form.







Additionally, VA does not consistently advise the veteran which form should have been used and does not provide the correct form to the claimant to file.



When the veteran eventually files the correct form, he or she may have lost months of entitlement.

VA does not accept a claim submitted on the wrong form as a claim submission or as a placeholder.



This issue was complicated by the implementation of the Appeals Modernization Act (AMA).

VA will not accept a claims for previously denied issues on any form except VAF 20-0995 Supplemental Claim, which, again, can lead to a significant delay or loss of an earlier effective date.





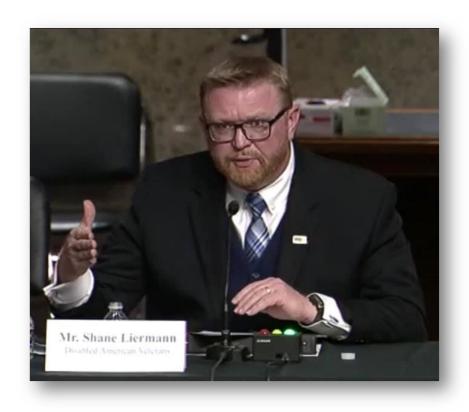
Additionally, if a veteran submits an appeal directly to the Board of Veterans' Appeals on the wrong form, it could be months before it's discovered, and the veteran could lose an earlier effective date or even incur expiration of the appeal period.



VA's current processes are placing an unnecessary burden on too many veterans, which was not the intent of Congress when the AMA was enacted into law.







On May 12th, DAV testified before the Senate Veterans
Affairs Committee and the issue of VA forms was directly addressed.



Subsequent to the hearing, the Acting Under Secretary for the Veterans Benefits Administration resolved to correct the forms and effective date issues.





Protecting Benefits From Erosion







Approximately 350,000 veterans are in receipt of TDIU

TDIU was established by the VA Secretary's regulatory authority and is **NOT** codified by statute.



For years, there have been proposals to take TDIU from certain veterans:

- placing restrictions, such as age, or
- eliminating TDIU



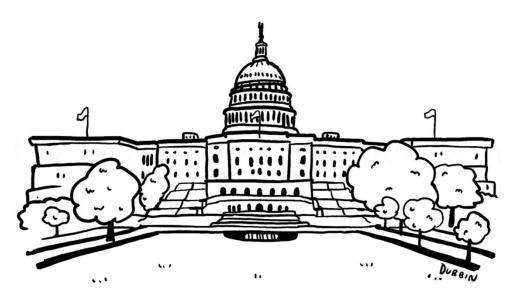


The Congressional Budget Office (CBO) made recommendations in 2013, 2014, 2016, and 2018 to limit and restrict TDIU.

The December 2020 Congressional Budget Office (CBO) report included a proposal to "End VA's Individual Unemployability Payments to Disabled Veterans at the Full Retirement Age for Social Security"



Because of PAYGO rules, Congress is required to offset the cost of new veterans legislation by cutting existing programs, like TDIU.





DAV's Goal



To protect TDIU, we need to have it codified into law. That way, VA will not be able to just make a regulation change to restrict TDIU; it would take an act of Congress.



DAV's Goal

Congress must pass the <u>Protecting Benefits for Disabled</u> <u>Veterans Act</u> and protect TDIU.
